BACKGROUND (*)

Climate change and environmental degradation are some of the biggest threats affecting the world's children and have the potential to undermine many of the gains we have made in child survival and development. Over a billion children are already at extremely high risk of environmental and climate hazards. There is therefore an urgent and acute need for countries to adapt, prepare and build climate-resilient, low-carbon social services, such as – water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), healthcare, education, nutrition, social protection and child protection – for current hazards, and in preparation for more frequent and severe climate hazards.

The Eastern Caribbean faces significant challenges due to the adverse impacts of climate change, including increased frequency and intensity of natural hazards such as hurricanes, floods, and droughts. These climate-related events have profound effects on the well-being, safety, and future of children and youth, disrupting their education, health, and overall development. At the same time, children are not only victims. Children contribute significantly to climate action within their communities, countries and globally. Their right to participate in decision-making that affects their lives is recognized under the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. Evidence shows that public spending on children is a wise investment that builds human capital, benefiting not only children but also their communities and countries more broadly. Investments in children lead to rises in income, contributing to sustainable development and cohesive societies. Conversely, climate finance and action that overlooks the rights of children weakens the efficacy of climate change response measures, and risks contributing to adverse social outcomes and deepening inequalities, inadvertently harming rather than protecting children and their families. Yet, just 2.4% of climate finance from key Multi-lateral Climate Funds (MCFs) can be classified as supporting projects incorporating child-responsive activities (Children's Environmental Rights Initiative (CERI) coalition, 2023).

UNICEF ECA, recognizing the urgency to address these challenges, aims to bolster climate and disaster resilience in the Eastern Caribbean, focusing on safeguarding and promoting the rights and well-being of children and youth through increasing climate investments for children. In order to support this work the Climate, Energy, Environment and Disaster Risk Reduction (CEED) section at UNICEF ECA aims to work with partners such as the Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS) to tap into various climate finance envelopes.

The OECS is an eleven-member grouping, with six Member States that are independent countries (Antigua and Barbuda, the Commonwealth of Dominica, Grenada, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia, and Saint Vincent and the Grenadines); five Member States are either UK (Anguilla, the British Virgin Islands and Montserrat) or French (Guadeloupe and Martinique) Overseas Territories. These islands are among the smallest in the world and home to an estimated population of 1,509,721 inhabitants; 30% of which are children (individuals aged 0-17 years) and 24% are youth (individuals aged 15 to 29 years).

The Climate and Disaster Resilience Unit (CDRU) under the OECS' Environmental Sustainability Division leads the OECS Commission's Climate Change Work Programme. The programme ensures the OECS Commission is firmly committed to assisting Member States, individually and collectively, in their efforts "to build climate resilient, low-carbon economies". This is achieved within the regional legal framework established under the St. George's Declaration of Principles for Environmental Sustainability in the OECS and the Revised Treaty of Basseterre (2010). On May 2021, the OECS Commission developed the OECS Climate Change Adaptation Strategy and Action Plan 2021-2026 (CCASAP). It was adopted by the 8th Council of Ministers: Environmental Sustainability and sets out a framework and a series of actions for strengthening the OECS' resilience to the impacts of climate change, on the basis of a comprehensive and integrated regional approach. It is based on three transformative pathways:

- PATHWAY 1 to improve access to data and information to increase actionable climate knowledge
- PATHWAY 2 to enhance capacity building / Adaptation interventions implementation
- PATHWAY 3 to enhance Leadership Governance Resource mobilisation for climate change adaptation

UNICEF ECA is therefore seeking a consultant to support the development of a pipeline of projects for the OECS countries through the OECS Commission, to mobilise resources as defined under Pathway 3. The pipeline of projects should primarily focus on inclusion of children's rights and social services (WASH, health, education, etc).

PURPOSE/SCOPE OF ACTIVITY/ASSIGNMENT (*)

- 1. Goal and Objective: Under the supervision of Programme Specialist (DRR and Climate Change), the consultant will work directly with the OECS Commission to develop innovative, impactful, and sustainable projects that enhance climate and disaster resilience, specifically tailored to mitigate risks faced by children and youth in the Eastern Caribbean region (particularly Grenada, Saint Lucia, Antigua and Barbuda and Commonwealth of Dominica). The objectives:
 - i. Engagements with Member States to identify their development resilience priorities, nested within their national development strategies, plans to combat climate variability and change.
 - ii. The design of the concept notes including, inter alia, the completion or assisting in the project's/programme's appraisal, stakeholders' consultation, applying gender considerations and review of environmental and social safegurds, where necessary;
 - iii. Elaborate one of the concept notes into a full proposal to be submitted to an identified finance envelope
- 2. **Provide details/reference to AWP areas covered:** Within the framework of the Multi-country Programme 2022-2026, this consultancy contributes to the Output 4.1 Government and regional institutions capacities are strengthened to support child-sensitive climate-related policies and programmes.

3. Activities and Tasks:

Under the guidance of the Programme Specialist (DRR and CC), UNICEF ECA and in close collaboration with the Programme Director for Climate and Disaster Resilience (OECS), the consultant is required to undertake the following tasks:

Convene an Inception Meeting

Convene kick off/inception meeting with OECS and UNICEF to discuss the methodology and planned approach
for project development under the assignment.

Support development of concept notes

- Review relevant documentation and literature in relation to the vulnerability of children and climate vulnerability
 of key sectors, existing climate policies, plans, programmes and projects;
- Hold preliminary discussions with government representatives;
- Identify 3 project ideas based on priorities of OECS Member countries;
- Conduct research and analysis to support development of climate rationale for the development of 3 concept notes;
- Develop 3 comprehensive concept notes, through a e-consultative process, focusing on the inclusion of children's rights and ensuring the resilience of social services (WASH, health, education, etc) and disaster risk reduction (e.g. early warning systems, nature-based solutions). Collaborate with OECS to identify the most suitable donors for the submission of the concept notes to mobilise resources;
- Prioritise one concept note to be developed into a full proposal, based on criteria agreed upon with OECS and UNICEF.

Develop full proposal

- Develop a full proposal from one concept note to meet commitments under countries' NDCs and/or NAPs, climate policies for submission to potential donor(s).
 - a. Define activities under each project component, as well as project implementation arrangements, detailed budget, co-financing (if any), impact potential, gender considerations, sustainability plan and exit strategy:
 - b. Collaborate with UNICEF, OECS, and OECS Member States to elaborate the proposal, as well as identify the donor institution.
- Organize and convene stakeholder consultations/dialogues (in-person or virtual) to validate and refine project proposal;
- Revise and enhance project proposal by incorporating stakeholder feedback.

4. Work relationships:

The consultant will be supervised by the UNICEF ECA's Programme Specialist (DRR and CC) who will provide administrative support regarding contractual arrangements and provide technical guidance to the process to ensure the child lens is included. In addition, the consultant will work in close collaboration with the Programme Director for Climate and Disaster Resilience (OECS) for all other technical matters under the consultancy.

Under the guidance of Programme Director for Climate and Disaster Resilience (OECS), the consultant will convene the necessary stakeholders and be required to engage with them for activities outlined in the consultancy. Consultations may be virtual or in-person and this will be defined in consultation with OECS and UNICEF. These consultations may take place Grenada, Saint Lucia, Antiqua and Barbuda and Commonwealth of Dominica

TRAVEL REQUIREMENTS*

The assignment will require the consultant to travel two of the four countries: Grenada, Saint Lucia, Antigua and Barbuda and Commonwealth of Dominica for a period of 5 days.

The consultant is responsible for arranging his/her own travel, including bearing the costs visas and travel insurance. Accommodation, meals and incidentals costs must not exceed the UN daily subsistence allowance rates. The costs for approved travels will be reimbursed by the UNICEF ECA upon submission of receipts and based on applicable UN DSA rates. All approved travels to be conducted in accordance with UNICEF travel rules and regulations.

PAYMENT SCHEDULE

Payment of professional fees will be based on submission of agreed deliverables which receive satisfactory quality review. In general, individual contracts shall not allow for fee advances. Meetings will monitor the work plan's milestone dates – to ensure appropriate time is allocated for feedback to concept notes and proposal.
