Purpose of Activity/Assignment:				

BACKGROUND

Jamaica is home to nearly three million people, with approximately 770,000 children under the age of 18. Since ratifying the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) in 1991, Jamaica has made notable progress in meeting its obligations under the CRC. However, despite progress made in improving the well-being of children, significant shortfalls remain. Of particular concern is the high level of violence experienced by children at home, at school, in their communities, in childcare and justice institutions and over the internet – consistently ranking Jamaica as one of the most violent countries in the world.

As a Pathfinder Country under the Global Partnership to End Violence Against Children, Jamaica is committed to addressing violence against children as a national priority. This commitment is embodied in the National Plan of Action for an Integrated Response to Children and Violence (NPACV) 2018-2023. The NPACV is structured around the global End Violence INSPIRE strategies - a technical package consisting of seven evidence-based strategies that together provide a framework for ending violence against children.

While important work has thus been undertaken in Jamaica to better protect children from violence, the lack of up-to-date, comprehensive, and disaggregated national level data on the prevalence of violence has impacted the country's capacity to design, budget, implement and monitor the adequacy and effectiveness of child protection interventions (prevention and response) under the NPACV. The lack of data has also impacted the functioning of the child protection system, as confirmed by the findings from the UNICEF-supported Child Protection System Evaluation (2022).

The Jamaica Violence Against Children and Youth Survey (VACS) that was carried out by the Government of Jamaica, in collaboration with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), is currently in the data analyses phase. The study offers an opportunity to address gaps in the evidence base to ensure that programmes and interventions addressing violence are indeed informed by more up to date evidence. The VACS collected nationally-representative data among 13 – 24-year-old males and females on the prevalence and circumstances surrounding physical, emotional, and sexual violence in childhood and young adulthood (before age 24). It will provide important information on risk and protective factors, consequences of violence and access to services for survivors.

Data-to-Action Framework and VACS Report Launch

VACS data and post-VACS efforts drive change, propel policy reform, and strengthen programmes. Strong government leadership and coordination across sectors is essential to driving change. VACS Data to Action aims to translate VACS data into evidence-based national action to address violence against children. The process provides an opportunity to develop data-driven, evidence-based, and

actionable recommendations to develop or enhance the national action to address violence against children. Development of a Data-to-Action Framework is key to inform steps to address violence against children and give insight into where current activities can be strengthened and expanded. It will provide the Jamaican Inter-sectoral Committee on Children and Violence (the committee responsible for monitoring the implementation of the NPACV) with the necessary evidence informed strategies and multi-sector action planning to better prevent and respond to violence against children. In addition, VACS findings will be used to help raise awareness of the scope of the problem, promote positive social and behaviour change, and advocacy for law and policy reform and support systems strengthening.

The Data-to-Action Framework will draw on the INSPIRE technical package. As such, it is expected that the Framework will include measures / actions to strengthen core elements of the national child protection system, including specific measures to strengthen the implementation and monitoring and evaluation of the NPACV, as well as social and behaviour change initiatives targeting society, communities, parents, and children themselves.

PURPOSE

The objective of this consultancy is to:

- Coordinate the stakeholder engagement, development, and implementation of the Jamaica Violence against Children & Youth Survey (Jamaica VACS) Data-to-Action Framework.
- Coordinate the launch of the Jamaica VACS final report

Scope of Work:

The consultant will design a data to action framework that will translate findings from the VACS into meaningful prevention and response policies and programmes and guide evidence-based advocacy towards policy and legal changes to ban the use of violence against children in all settings. It will also inform the implementation of the National Plan of Action for an Integrated Response to Children and Violence (NPACV). This includes supporting consultations / workshops with multi-sectoral partners (Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs), Private Sector Organizations, Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) and Faith-based Organizations (FBOs)) and launching the VACS report.
