BACKGROUND

Background information:

Climate change, energy access and environmental degradation are equity issues, with children and young people often being the most vulnerable and affected. Addressing climate change, disaster risk, energy access and environmental degradation is therefore vital for building a more sustainable future for children. In addition, it is imperative that we integrate our actions on the SDGs and our humanitarian responses. Each of the five Outcomes Areas of the UNICEF Strategic Plan 2022-2025 health, nutrition, education, child protection, WASH and social protection- is affected in some way by climate change, disaster and/or environmental degradation. Fortunately, each stream of UNICEF work also presents opportunities to act on climate, energy, environment and/or disaster risk reduction (DRR) to deliver more sustainable results. There are major implications of climate change, disaster, lack of energy access and environmental degradation for children, where UNICEF has strong potential to strengthen the response to these issues. UNICEF in Belarus is planning to conduct a Climate Landscape Analysis for Children, examining the baseline situation of climate, energy and environment-related issues affecting children and how they relate to UNICEF's priorities. The report will look at stakeholders, government policies and relevant programmes in Belarus. It will also provide recommendations on how UNICEF in Belarus could further incorporate and strengthen work on climate, energy and environment-related issues in its current country programme, as well, as serve as part of the Situational Analysis in preparation for the new Country Program Document for 2026-2030.

Overall Purpose of the Assignment:

The overall objective is to develop the Climate Landscape Analysis for Children (CLAC) for Belarus through the collecting, compiling and reviewing key resources which provide data on the baseline situation of climate, energy and environment-related issues affecting children in Belarus and their relation to UNICEF's priorities in the country.

Scope of Work:



The ToR assignment will be completed by the Team of Consultants composing of the International consultant (Team Leader) and National Consultant (Consultant) and in close collaboration and partnership with the main Republican Center of Ecology and Landscape History to strengthen the capacity to address this task. Each of the Consultants has their individual scope of work and deliverables that are listed in the table below.

The work will start with the team meeting and discussion of the overall coordination, the means of communication, the division of labour and the development of the consultancy workplan with timeline and deliverables. The Consultants will participate in regular online consultations with UNICEF supervisor and national experts, study participants. The international consultant will work remotely. However, 1-2 visits to Belarus may be required to attend and facilitate internal and external meetings, collect relevant data, engage in consultations with the CO's team, national stakeholders, draft reports and relevant strategic documents as per the timeline below.

1 phase (inception report development):

The Team of consultants will start with the data collection and review of relevant information including, but not limited to country-specific documents, international research and ratings related to Belarus, internal UNICEF documents, stakeholder mapping, etc. Based on the desk review, the national consultant will prepare the draft analysis of the desk review and submit to the Team Leader. The Team Leader will sum up all the information and draft the inception report which will include an initial assessment of the climate change situation of the country and how it relates to child survival and development including the following:

- The impact of climate change issues on children and young people (including migrant children and young people, children and young people living with disability, and gendered dimensions of climate change and its different impacts on boys and girls, etc.)
- Observed and projected changes in climate in the country and related impacts (air pollution, chemical pollution, etc.)
- Vital gender considerations in relation to roles and responsibilities in regard to water management, exposure to climate change hazards, safety dimensions (including increased gender-based violence [GBV]) and women's and girls' engagement in decision-making processes on climate change solutions leadership).
- Status of the integration of climate education in school curriculum and barriers of access for boys and girls.
- The energy situation for children (e.g., at home, school, health clinics, public lighting, etc.).
- Climate change influence on children's health.
- Initial thinking on comparative advantage of UNICEF on climate change issues in the country context.
- Overview of existing curricular and programs on educating children and young people on climate agenda, e.g. training in schools, educational programs, preparedness training, etc.

The inception report should include a draft list of stakeholders to be interviewed and an associated list of draft interview questions. Following completion of the inception report and its clearance with the UNICEF Focal Point the team of consultants will organize a half-day hybrid (in-person and virtual attendance) inception workshop for key national counterparts and UNICEF Programme colleagues to review proposed results to date and next steps.



2 phase (the CLAC report development):

Based on the inception report, the national consultant will conduct interviews with key national stakeholders and review the results of the focus group discussion with children and adolescents arranged by the Republican Center of Ecology and Landscape History. All received data will be summarized, analyzed and documented for the final report. The final report should have analyses of the impact of climate change issues on children in Belarus with the conclusions and recommendations for UNICEF strategic work with children and adolescents on climate mitigation and adaptation issues.

The draft CLAC report will be presented and discussed with key national stakeholders. The final version will incorporate the views of the internal and external stakeholders, UNICEF Focal points. The final report will include an executive summary (no longer than 4 pages) with key findings and recommendations. The report will be done in English.

Based on the final approved CLAC report, the Team Leader will prepare the following additional documents:

- Summary PPP
- A 4-pager policy brief (for Donors, UNICEF and international partners)
- Executive Summary CLAC (for national and international stakeholders)

The key questions to be answered by the CLAC include, but are not limited to, the following:

The main factors and risks of climate change for children in Belarus:

- What are the main climate, environment, energy and Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) issues affecting Belarus?
- What risk analysis exists (climate change, natural hazards, environmental, economic, conflict, etc.)? What is the likelihood of these risks? Are there risks resulting from the combination of threats or dangers and vulnerabilities at different levels, to which children and young people are exposed? Are the risk analyses child sensitive and aim to protect the rights of children and young people? Does the analysis go down to the subnational and local levels? Has the analysis been used to inform any action to date? How is the severity of these risks and how is the capacity of children and young people to cope with risks?
- What are the main factors related to climate change in the country that would most affect livelihoods, capacities and opportunities for children and young people? Which groups of children and young people are particularly vulnerable? What are the gendered differences? What will be the impact on children (especially the most vulnerable) if the risks of the above factors are not mitigated at associated timelines?

Policy and normative framework:

- What are the government policies and strategies/priorities on climate change issues? What are the budgetary commitments? Who are the partners / counterparts involved and how/do they work together (e.g., Ministry of Environment, private sector, etc.)?
- Do government or sector policies and strategies/priorities on climate change areas consider children's rights? Do the national children's right strategies/priorities consider climate change?
 What are the bottlenecks and barriers that affect compliance with the rights of children and young people?

The main actors:



- Who are the main actors in climate change initiatives? What are the ongoing climate change initiatives and programmes, including UNICEF CO if relevant? Do on-going climate change initiatives and programmes benefit children?

Children's and adolescents' engagement:

- Is the climate agenda (climate mitigation and adaptation, green skills, eco-friendly behaviour, environmental literacy, emergency preparedness, etc.) integrated in formal and informal education?
- How are children and young people engaged, consulted in climate change initiatives? Have any results been achieved through their meaningful engagement? What are children's and young people's perceptions and expectations for action on climate change?

Capacity to address risks at the National and local levels:

- What are the capacities that exist at the national and provincial levels to reduce the risks associated with climate change?
- Does education, health and social protections systems have resources and capacity to address the DRR and climate change issues and impact on children and adolescents?
- How are DRR and climate change issues incorporated in the formal and non-formal education of children and adolescents?
- Are transitional and green skills development for children and adolescents well developed in professional orientation programmes and flexible to address the changing labour market needs and green transition of the economy?
- Does the education of children and teachers fully meet the needs of children and adolescents to be prepared for DRR, climate risks and any negative implications/developments, etc.?
- Are there capacity building programs on DRR and climate change for education specialists of general secondary, vocational and additional training educational establishments?

Donor support:

- Which donors are most likely to fund UNICEF climate change initiatives and programmes and their availability and relevance for Belarus?

Influence on UNICEF programming:

- How do the identified climate change issues affect UNICEF's current and planned initiatives and programmes?

Opportunities and gaps:

- What are the opportunities and gaps in the design of climate change plans and strategies to protect the rights of children and young people?
- Identification of knowledge gaps on climate change issues and recommended actions to fulfil the gaps.

Recommendations and follow up actions:

- How to strengthen government efforts to address identified climate change risks in a way that ensure children's and adolescents' rights, increase their resilience, and enable the full development of their potential?
- How to inform and improve policies, strategies and plans, legal and regulatory frameworks, as well as budgeting to ensure better preparedness and response to climate change risks on children and young people?
- How best to inform child-centred updates to the Nationally Determined Contribution (NDC), National Adaptation Plan (NAP), and other national strategies?



- How to build resilience of vulnerable communities and populations climate change, with reflections on individuals' daily lives and behaviours?
- How can adolescent and young people be engaged to strengthen their adaptation and resilience to identified risks?
- What is UNICEF's comparative advantage, strategic partnerships and intervention platforms?
- What are the opportunities and entry points for programming on child-centred climate change action?
- What are the key messages for UNICEF to increase awareness and action for adaptation and resilience to climate change?
- How can UNICEF support the Government to address gaps in climate change programming to benefit children?

Supervision of the consultancy:

The overall supervision of the consultancy will be provided by the YAD and HIV/AIDS Specialist (UNICEF Focal Point). The Team of Consultants will work closely with the Republican Center of Ecology and Landscape History.
