1. BACKGROUND/CONTEXT

1. BACKGROUND/CONTEXT

The Government of Suriname supported by its partners is focused on achieving the Sustainable Development Goals, including those focused on the rights of children and adolescents. Suriname has a small population based on the 2012 Housing and Population Censuses i.e., about 560,741 of which 35.2 per cent are children i.e., persons under the age of 18 years. Suriname is categorized as upper-middle-income country with a human development index of 99 of 191.

However, according to the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), more than 26% of Suriname's population was (monetarily) poor in 2017, based on the Suriname Living Conditions Survey, conducted in 2016 and 2017 (SSLC 2016/17). Nearly half (48%) of the people living in the rural interior of the country are estimated poor, revealing high discrepancies based on geographic location. Moreover, multidimensional poverty among children 0-17 years reaches 36.2%, with high variability across age groups and areas of residence. Children living in rural areas (39.8%), and especially in the rural interior (79.1%), face much higher multidimensional deprivation rates in comparison with children living in urban areas (26.6%). According to the preliminary results of the second wave of the SSLC, carried out in 2022, the multidimensional poverty is about 43%, with high deprivations on health-related indicators, overcrowding, school backwardness and housing.

Although Suriname is classified by the World Bank as a high-middle-income country, the living conditions and income of about half of the population do not reflect this welfare level. The current estimated GDP per capita is USD 4,784.5 but there are huge disparities at the district level. Besides the inequality among households of different geographical areas, the deterioration of the economy affected households at the national level. Between 2015 and 2022 the purchasing power of all households has declined significantly. International commodity shocks, and the high fiscal and debt burden have weakened the financial-economic situation and social security system. The government has set out its policy strategy, based on its homegrown recovery plan, support from the IMF, and its medium-term policy framework aligning with the Multi-annual Development Plan 2022-2026.

These Terms of Reference are for an individual Consultant to conduct a Situation Analysis (SitAn) on children living with disability in Suriname. This SitAn will utilise a rights-based, gender sensitive, equity-focused and risk informed approach and will provide an accurate understanding of the current situation of children living with disability in Suriname, which is critical to inform (primarily) national strategies for at-scale programming. The Government of Suriname – The National Monitoring Commission for persons with a disability is partnering with UNICEF to conduct this Situation Analysis on Children with disabilities.

SCOPE and Objectives

This Situation Analysis on Children with disabilities will be conducted in Suriname and will assess key issues and deprivations affecting children with disabilities. It will examine inputs, achievements, and bottlenecks



across all sectors, within the context of age-groups identifying those barriers that prevent children with disabilities from benefiting from interventions and services. It will also consider interventions and situations that strengthen and support the lives of children with disabilities. Besides, it will determine where the policy and or activities are good and could be strengthened. By adopting a people-centered approach, the Situation Analysis is expected to identify some noticeable gaps in cross-fertilization between stakeholders that work with/for children with disabilities. Given the importance of gender roles and relations between girls and boys, such considerations will be incorporated as an analytical approach in the SitAn to highlight gender disparities.

The scope and key actions of the SitAn is further defined below:

- Develop a deep understanding of the situation of children and adolescents living with disabilities (CWD), by analyzing the policies and strategies, social and economic trends affecting them (data disaggregated by age, gender, urban/rural, ethnicity, socio-economic status, etc.). The SITAN will be rights-based and aligned with the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD)5.
- Identify and analyze the barriers and bottlenecks that prevent CWD from benefiting from social services across sectors and enjoying their rights. Specially focusing on undertaking an analysis of the policy environment and identify what children with disabilities themselves and their caregivers see as the pressing needs in their country and community.
- Identify and analyze the barriers and bottlenecks that prevent CWD from benefiting from social services across sectors and enjoying their rights. - Provide government and non-government partners with comprehensive evidence-based analysis on CWD for result-based decision-making, so the priorities CWD are integrated into the socio-economic development agenda. If possible, evaluate the capacity of stakeholders, including government and civil society, to provide inclusive and accessible services.
- Identify critical data gaps and contribute to the generation of evidence that can improve the monitoring of the rights of CWD.

The questions the Situation Analysis on children with disabilities intend to answer, include:

POLICY

- Has the government signed or ratified the CRPD?
 - a. If yes, analyse if national legislations and policies are compliant with the CRPD, and to what extent the government is taking steps to realize the rights of children and women with disabilities. Refer to CRPD Concluding Observations as a reference for compliance.
- To what extent are the rights of children with disabilities and their families articulated in national policies?
- What is the government's approach to the education of children with disabilities in policy and practice (i.e., inclusive education, integrated education, or special schools)?

BARRIERS

How do child rights deprivations manifest themselves in the case of disability?



- To what extent are children with disabilities and their caregivers excluded from participation in society based on social and cultural practices and beliefs?
- To what extent do children with disabilities have the same level of participation as children without disabilities?
- What are the immediate, underlying, and structural barriers and bottlenecks to the well-being of children with disabilities and to accessing and utilizing basic social services and other critical resources?
- How do outcomes and barriers differ when comparing children with disabilities and children without disabilities?
- How do outcomes and barriers differ across subgroups of children with disabilities (e.g., girls, indigenous children, or adolescents) by geographical areas, during humanitarian situations and in development contexts?
 - 6a. Which are the most deprived groups of children and parents with disabilities in terms of access and facing negative attitudes?
 - o 6b. What forms of deprivation and exclusion do they face?
 - o 6c. What are the determining factors that give rise to and perpetuate their exclusion?
- It is important to note that children with disabilities may face some specific barriers depending on the nature of their disability.

STAKEHOLDERS & ENABLING ENVIRONMENT

- What capacities (financial, technical, and institutional) exist at the national, subnational and community levels to address the inclusion of children with disabilities?
- What existing social, institutional, and political factors (e.g., social norms, institutional capacities at all levels of government, accountability and coordination mechanisms, policy, and legal frameworks) could potentially support the creation of an enabling environment for the realization of the rights of children with disabilities?

PROGRAMME S & SERVICE S

- To what extent are the physical, communications and information environments accessible for people with disabilities?
- To what extent are mainstream services and programmes inclusive of and accessible to children with disabilities?
 - o a. Have health, WASH, nutrition and education services and programmes taken measures to be more inclusive?
- To what extent do social protection measures exist and are inclusive of and reach children with disabilities and their families?
 - a. To what extent are families of children with disabilities aware of these social protection measures?
- Are specialized services for children with disabilities available in the country (such as rehabilitation and provision of assistive devices)?
- How are the voices of children with disabilities and their families or their representative organizations incorporated into the design and planning of national/local strategies and programmes?
- How satisfied are children and their families with the current services and programmes?



DATA & EVIDENCE

- To what extent is disability-disaggregated data collected in the country (at the national, subnational and community levels), such as in administrative data systems?
- To what extent is the data used for decision-making?
- Is there relevant research, evidence or best practice programme approaches available in the region?
 - o a. How can the country programme draw upon and align to these?

METHODOLOGY

The process of developing the Situation Analysis on Children with Disability will make use of multiple methodologies and techniques and will identify and utilize existing data (studies, evaluations, KAP and other surveys, market, and supply chain, etc.), as well as recommend additional data needed to fill critical gaps. This SitAn, to the extent practicable, will follow the relevant guidance on the New Generation SitAn¹ and focus on understanding the situation of children with disabilities, with clear causality. It will, through the lenses of children's rights, seek to assess what is working and the actions needed to take results for children with disabilities to scale.

A purposive sample will be determined, from the groups that work with, and or provide support to children living with disability. This will include children with disability, parents, guardians, staff, and managers of facilities that support children with disabilities, schools/learning institutions, decision-makers across Government sectors at the national and subnational levels, business sector, and community leaders and members. This mixed-method assignment will draw on good practices of similar SitAn, and global guidelines and regional guidance. A local Steering/technical committee will provide sectoral perspective/guidance and political space and buy-in.

The SitAn will progress through the following three levels:

Phase 1: Desk review, interview with key personnel from NDMG and UNICEF, develop, research instruments, and submission of the inception report.

Desk review: The desk review and analysis will include disability surveys, annual reports, routine statistics and other reports from Government of Suriname, internationally agreed conventions, Studies, and analytical work, Reports from Programme Reviews and Evaluations and administrative data.

- Inception Report to be submitted on the 25th October 2024. The inception report will include an analytical framework) and a work plan with timelines. This report will be reviewed by NDMG, UNICEF, and other agreed stakeholders.
- **Development of research instruments**: In-depth interview (IDIs) and Focus Group Discussion (FGD) guides. The draft data collection tools will be pretested before finalization.
- Meetings with other national stakeholders.

Deliverable 1:

- Inception report with detailed work plan, tools, and template for final deliverables.

Phase 2: Data collection

The consultant is expected to conduct IDIs and FGDs with key personnel of NDMG, CSOs, facilities that care for children with disabilities, community leaders and UNICEF. The consultant is also expected to:

- conduct IDI with key stakeholders from the public and private sectors; development partners including UNICEF; religious and other community leaders and relevant civil society organisations, to collect relevant quantitative and qualitative data.
- conduct FGDs with representatives of Civil Society, children with disabilities and their parents/guardians.
- Conduct consultations to gather perceptions of the attainment of the rights of children with disabilities and the barriers and facilitators to the attainment of rights.
- Prepare and submit a progress report by the 30th November 2024.

Data Management

- ensure the absolute safety of all data (No data collected and or reviewed for this SitAn or data to which the consultant is privileged during the time of the SitAn process, as a direct or indirect result of being the consultant for this SitAn, can be shared and or used by the consultant, neither can s/he approve the use of the whole or any part of it, for personal or professional purposes, without approval, in writing, from NDMG and UNICEF jointly).
- Report may only be published with the express consent of NDMG and is to be used to develop national policy and programmes.

Phase 3: Data Analysis, sharing of findings and writing of the report.

- For the qualitative data generated by the conduct of IDIs and FGDs, the grounded theory methodology will be used, involving verbatim transcription, coding of data, development of themes, comparing of themes and recording of findings based on the analytical and conceptual frameworks for the development of a rights-based, equity-focused SitAn. For the quantitative data, conduct trend analyses (MICS), univariate and bivariate analyses will be conducted and presented in charts, graphs, and maps, where relevant, with strong evidence of triangulation.
- Using an analytical framework, undertake the causal analysis, role pattern analysis, and capacity gap analysis to better understand the causes of inequities and the determinants that facilitate or hamper the realization of the rights of children with disabilities.
- Based on the 10 determinants for effective coverage, bottleneck, and barriers analysis will be conducted in the main problem areas in terms of the rights of children with disabilities.
- The main findings will be presented by the consultant to the National Disability Monitoring Group (NDMG) and UNICEF and NDMG stakeholders, and enough time will be allocated for comments.
- The writing of the report should be done in constant communication with UNICEF/NDMG and NDMG, through UNICEF's Social Policy Specialist.
- The final report will be approved by NDMGand UNICEF.

Deliverable 3:

All final deliverables must be submitted in a way that is ready for printing – i.e., print-ready versions. The SITAN should be accessible and inclusive for individuals with disabilities, adhering to accessibility standards



such as compatibility with screen readers, alternative image text, clear formatting, and easy navigation. Thus, ensuring that all individuals, regardless of ability, can engage with and benefit from its content.

Ethical Consideration

- Review and approve the final report before final payment is made.

The Consultant will:

- Meet initially with UNICEF to discuss in detail the consultancy and timelines.
- Review all necessary documentation.
- Submit inception report which will include the desk review report, instruments for data collection, the work plan for the SitAn on children with disabilities, and the outline for the final report.



Incorporate feedback from the steering committee and finalize inception report and pretest instruments, before proceeding to the data collection phase.

- Make logistical arrangements and conduct data collection exercises with support from UNICEF.
- Prepare and submit a draft final report and present a synopsis of the findings to UNICEF.
- Prepare and submit a comprehensive final report.
- The consultant shall act in a manner within the laws of the country of Suriname and the core values (CRITAS) of UNICEF.
